he 87th Annual Meeting of Members for Dunn Energy Cooperative was a success as 157 people gathered to celebrate another solid year for their cooperative and elect three new members to the board of directors. The meeting was kicked off with a light dinner, catered by the Viking Bowl in Colfax.

Directors in three districts met their term limits in 2024. Those directors, Jim Wildner, Lee Jensen, and Tom Zwiefelhofer, each served four threeyear terms for your cooperative. Dunn Energy Cooperative is unique amongst electric cooperatives as one of the few that have term limits. Not only that, but your cooperative practices good governance in making sure directors stand for election every three years. The bylaws of your cooperative state that there shall be two directors on the ballot, so no one can run unopposed.

These outgoing board members did good and valuable things for your cooperative. All three became Credentialed Cooperative Directors through NRECA's continuing education program. They also represented and advocated for you at state and national meetings over the years.

Individually, Jim Wildner cares deeply for the safety of our members and employees. As a retired employee of West Wisconsin 24/7 Telcom, he came in with a greater knowledge of the cooperative business model and offered sound advice on technology efforts here at Dunn Energy.

Lee Jensen, from Five Star Dairy, is

an innovator and really knows how to take in the big picture. Not only did Lee care about what was happening now in our industry, but also what the future could bring. Developing sustainability in farming has made him and his farm leaders in our community. He always encouraged the cooperative to look at ways to make our energy more environmentally responsible, while continuing to maintain reliability.

Tom Zwiefelhofer has been a very engaged board member during his time on the board. He's held executive leadership positions on the board including the vice president positions on both the Dunn Energy board as well as the Dairyland Power board of directors. He has worked tirelessly for you, our members. (345002)



With their departure, we have three new board members to welcome to the cooperative, each elected to a three-year term. We are excited to work with Jeff Wildner, Dennis Dvoracek, and Michael Jenson Jr.

Guest speaker Ben Porath, executive vice president and chief operating officer at Dairyland Power Cooperative, spoke about the Dairyland Power Cooperative diversified energy portfolio. He noted that how you think about energy planning has changed greatly over the years, and now includes matters like reducing carbon, adding more renewable energy, and how to cover consumer energy needs when intermittent resources don't produce enough energy. The key takeaway from the presentation was that the energy transition will happen, but we must maintain reliability and affordability at all costs.

This fit well with the theme of the evening as board President Jeff Gasteyer talked to members about the reliability of power and what that means to end users. Topics included brushing rightsof-way, work plans, having a diversified energy portfolio, and being fiscally responsible. He ended his speech by

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telling members that as our country transitions to a cleaner energy future, we must not lose sight of reliability and to let time be our friend in this endeavor.

Dunn Energy CEO Jesse Singerhouse spoke to the group about the state of the cooperative. He highlighted the addition of two one-megawatt solar arrays to the Dunn Energy system in 2023, of which all output is contracted to the cooperative. He noted a third is in the works for 2026. He then pivoted to the financials of the cooperative, noting that revenues of \$27.6 million in 2023 exceeded the prior year by \$429,000. Operating expenses were slightly higher in 2023 due to increased costs of materials and services needed to run the day-to-day business of the cooperative. All in all, however, it was a solid year for Dunn Energy. Singerhouse pointed out a letter from Bauman and Associates, our independent financial auditors. The letter stated that the 2023 audit has been completed and the cooperative has received a clean audit.

A few key facts about the cooperative were pointed out for members as well. In 2023 Dunn Energy returned over \$1 million in capital credits to members, with over \$24 million having been returned since the cooperative incorporated. It was also noted that locally, the cooperative returned close to \$70,000 to members in the form of energy efficiency rebates, \$17,000 in scholarships, and over \$31,000 in Operation Round Up grants. These were all programs that align with Cooperative Principle 7: Concern for Community.

Another highlight of the meeting, which supports Cooperative Principle 5: Education, Training, and Information, was the announcement of a new program the cooperative is launching this fall. The Power Connection: Conversations with your Cooperative will be a five-session program where a small group of members will be invited to learn more about Dunn Energy Cooperative. Topics to be covered include:

Co-ops 101: The history, principles, and governance of Dunn Energy Cooperative.

Our Energy Landscape: Beneficial electrification, renewable energy, shifting energy resources and more.

The Grid: What makes up the grid and the entities involved in delivering your power.

Future Challenges: Grid stability, legislation, and member engagement.
