ur safety program at Dunn Energy Cooperative is one of continual improvement. We always look for ways to operate more safely and educate people about electrical safety.

Each morning our crews start their day with a briefing to go over the day's work. Once they are at the jobsite the foreman will again go over the work to be done and address any safety issues. After the job is completed, the crews make sure that everything is safe before they leave.

Monthly, our lineworkers attend safety training. This training covers a variety of topics and reminds them of standard procedures we use to be safe while working with electricity. We inspect gloves, trucks and tools daily to make sure they are in the proper condition. Five of your local Cooperatives share a safety officer who keeps us updated on the latest local, State and Federal requirements for safety.

We offer electrical safety education to the public as well. We have resources on our website and are available to do electrical safety demonstrations for the community. A group of local electric cooperatives is also producing a video that will be distributed to driver's education students in Wisconsin about what to do if there is an electrical line near a car accident.

Safety is truly a priority in everything we do. Electricity is a tremendous resource for your home, farm or business. But can be dangerous if we forget to act safely. Take some time to educate yourself and your family on electrical safety. Stay safe everyone.



KNOW TO DO _____

if in an Auto Accident with Power Lines



Even if you do not touch lines or equipment, you can still be killed or seriously injured.



- 1. Do NOT leave the car. and warn others to stay away.
- 2. Call 911 to have the utility notified.



3. Wait until a utility professional has told you it is safe.



The **only** reason to exit the vehicle is if it's on fire.

If the car is on fire, jump clear of the vehicle: with feet together, and without touching the car and the ground at the same time.

Continue to hop away with your feet together as far as you can.
