Dairyland Power

arly in June several Dunn Energy Cooperative board members and I travelled to La Crosse to attend the Dairyland Power Cooperative (DPC) annual meeting. Like Dunn Energy, Dairyland Power is a cooperative organization. Dunn Energy is an owner of Dairyland Power along with 23 other distribution cooperatives in Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa and Illinois.

Dairyland was established over 75 years ago to provide the electricity that Dunn Energy and the other distribution co-ops sell to our members. Dunn Energy is a distribution co-op. Dairyland is a generation and transmission coop. Dairyland generates electricity and sends it over 3,200 miles of transmission lines to the substations in Dunn Energy's and the other distribution co-op's service territories.

Dairyland owns some power plants. Like the big coal-fired plant down in Alma on the Mississippi River. Or the natural gas fired plant near Elk Mound in Chippewa County. And they have a hydro dam on the Flambeau River east of Ladysmith, Wisconsin. Dairyland also contracts with other businesses to buy electricity.

Not too many years ago almost all of the electricity Dairyland sold to us was generated by coal fired power plants. In the early part of this century things started to change. The State of Wisconsin required an increase in electricity produced from renewable sources. Also required was a lot of investment to reduce emissions from coal power plants. The effort to meet these requirements cost a lot of money and the price of the electricity we bought from Dairyland went up a lot. The electricity we buy from Dairyland is almost 70% of our total costs here at Dunn Energy. So our rates went up a lot in those years.

Dairyland made some careful strategic decisions. Some of the old coal plants in Alma were retired. Dairyland invested in a number of solar arrays to produce solar electricity. Contracts were signed to buy more wind energy. The price of electricity from wind has come down a lot in recent years. Investments were made to clean the emissions from the remaining coal plants too. This made them cleaner and a reliable source of electricity when the wind isn't blowing.

As a result of these actions and other steps taken, our rates from Dairyland have changed very little in recent years. As I said, the price of the electricity we buy from Dairyland is almost 70% of our total costs. And because Dairyland's rates have not changed much in the past 6 years, neither have Dunn Energy's rates. We have only had to increase rates once in the past 6 years.

Today over 20 percent of the electricity DPC sells comes from renewables. So not only has the price of electricity changed very little, it has gotten cleaner as well. Dairyland has also taken steps to close the small nuclear reactor it owns. The facility located a half hour south of La Crosse is being taken down. The fuel is in safe storage and all other buildings and materials are being removed from the site. The project is expected to be complete by the end of the year and it is expected to come in on budget.



Thanks to careful financial management Dairyland has managed to increase its equity in recent years without significant increases in rates. This further strengthens Dairyland's financial position and recently Dairyland was awarded an A+ financial rating from Standard and Poor's rating agency.

Solar Project Partnership

enomonie, WI – In a collaboration, Dunn Energy Cooperative, Water Source Heating and Cooling of Eau Claire, and the School District of the Menomonie Area have successfully completed a project insuring renewable energy for years to come for the district.

Through a grant from the Dunn Energy Cooperative Operation Round Up program and the resources of Jesse Green from Water Source Heating and Cooling, the Bjornson Education-Recreation Center, known locally as the Environmental Site, has installed a 3kW photovoltaic array. This, along with the School District's participation in the Dunn Energy SunDEC Community Solar array brings the Environmental Site to a 100% renewable status. All energy powering the Environmental Site comes from the sun!

"The success of this solar project is a great example of the good that can happen when community partners come together," said Joe Zydowsky, District Administrator for the School District of the Menomonie Area. "We are proud to say that the school district's environmental site is now 100% powered by renewable energy. Not only has this been a wise investment for the School District of the Menomonie Area, but it also has the potential to serve as a good example and learning opportunity for our students and staff."

The solar panels at the Environmental Site have been up just short of a year and have produced a total of 2.55 Megawatt hours (MWh). The average home on Dunn Energy lines uses 1,000 kilowatt hours a month; meaning the small array at the Environmental Site has produced enough energy to power an average home for two and a half months straight!

"We often talk about preserving the future for the next generation; about making choices that make sense, not only for today, but for years to come. We believe the choice the district made will not only benefit their financial position today but will also educate our youth on the importance of sustainability for years to come," explained Jesse Singerhouse, Manager of Administrative and
